

Pilgrims Progress

The Lenten journey can be a lonely one. It may intensify the loneliness we experience in our lives. We may find common ground with a lonely seeker that Jesus met. His name was Zacchaeus and Luke tells his story (Luke 19:1-10)

Zacchaeus climbed a tree to get a better view. Maybe he climbed it to hide, but to hide hoping to be found. He was willing to try anything for a half-hour of companionship. Jesus found him, saw him, looked him square in the eye and said, "Zacchaeus, come on down!" And the people snickered up their sleeves because Jesus didn't know any better than to invite himself to the house of a man that no one else would touch with a ten-foot pole.

Zacchaeus' attempt to see Jesus provides a wealth of possible descriptive titles: The Short Jew, A Tree With a View, Up a Tree, Out on a Limb, or Come on Down. But I really like "A Short Seeker." It is descriptive of Zacchaeus and of us. Zacchaeus was hurting because he was isolated and insulated and so are we. He was short on hope, meaning, value, and purpose in life. He was seeking insight, understanding and healing. He sounds so contemporary. He sounds like us. Going at life alone isolates us. On occasions we go it alone because that is what we choose. Other times we are forced to go at life alone because others do not and will not be associated with us. It may be because of a stand we have taken, a conviction we hold, a profession we practice, a disease we have, body odor, our sexual orientation, or the color of our skin. Whenever we are isolated, regardless of the cause of the isolation, there is a dimension of our survival instinct that takes over and insulates us. We put on a mask and pretend, pretend to be happy, pretend to be enjoying life. We say that sticks and stones may break our bones, but words can never hurt us. We lie! We claim we really enjoy spending time by ourselves. We may when we can make the choice of whether or not to be alone. But to be isolated is to be by yourself when you do not want to be.

A few years ago an ad ran in a Kansas paper: "I will listen to you talk for thirty minutes without comment for \$5.00." Does that sound like a hoax? Would anybody call? You bet! It was not long before the individual who ran the ad was receiving between ten and twenty calls a day. The pain of loneliness was so sharp that some were willing to try anything for a half-hour of companionship.

Jesus knew what Zacchaeus was saying and seeking by being up a tree, out on a limb and he knows what we are saying and seeking when we isolate ourselves. I'm so glad Jesus said, "Zacchaeus, come on down." If he can say, "Zacchaeus, come on down," then he can say, "Howard, come on down," "Sarah, come on down," "Tom, come on down," and "Amy, come on down." Come on down from your perches of isolation, insulation and loneliness. Come on down to relationship, to friendship, to forgiveness, to love, to grace, to acceptance.



What is it? A Labyrinth is a spiritual tool dating back to ancient times. It offers a pathway of prayer and a walking meditation. It is not a maze, with tricks, obstacles, dead ends, and many paths; a labyrinth has a single pathway for entering and exiting. No directional decisions are necessary. Its whole is always visible; the Labyrinth represents a blue print for your heart and soul.

History: The earliest Labyrinths date from 3000 to 2500 BC. Labyrinth designs have been discovered among early Christian communities around 400 AD. During the 12th to 14th centuries, numerous cathedrals in Italy, Spain, and France had labyrinth designs built into the floor. The most renowned surviving labyrinth is in Chartres Cathedral, near Paris. It's believed that Christian pilgrims who could not afford to make the long journey to the Holy Land walked the Labyrinth as a metaphor for their journey to Jerusalem.

Spiritual Relevance for Today: Walking the Labyrinth is a personal journey or pilgrimage. The single pathway that leads you to the center and out again enables you to free your mind from mundane thoughts and concentrate on the sacred. Your walk, pace, and personal experience are all your own.

When will I be able to participate in the Labyrinth experience?
