

In the last issue of the **Broadcaster**, I did my best to explain the new proposed governance structure, constitution and bylaws for Glenview Community Church. The members of the Governance Task Force (Cathy Ach, Paul Bauerschmidt, Shane Bill, Leanne Drennan, Debby Fosdick, Megan McClung, Chuck Mize, Doug Morgan, Nancy Mullarkey, Karen Patterson-O'Brien, and Bob Mc-Gee, chair) have invested countless hours of energy, imagination, careful thought and hard work in creating a new governance structure for GCC that will best position GCC for a lively future of making God's love real in our dynamic culture.

In this endeavor, the Governance Task Force has relied on the pioneering work of a number of visionary congregations in the United Church of Christ that have shifted the focus of their governance structures away from institutional maintenance to transformational ministry. These congregations have experienced renewed vitality, a clearer sense of focus, greater freedom to try new things, and a stronger sense that they are doing the work of God's love in the world today. Our Governance Task Force members have labored so tirelessly because they love God, because they are devoted to GCC, and because they are fully invested in its future. I believe that our proposed governance structure holds just as great a promise for GCC as other congregations that have adopted similar structures have experienced.

Some have asked, *What will happen if the* congregation rejects this new structure, as well as the Interim Constitution and *Bylaws?* The practical answer is that we will have to make some immediate decisions to continue the old structure. On the strength of the Governance Task Force's proposal, the Leadership Committee has been working to recruit members for the positions in the new structure. That means that no one has been recruited for vacancies that will occur in the old structure as of May 31. Given that reality, the congregation would need to act to extend the terms of those presently serving on Boards for three to four months to give the Leadership Committee time over the summer to do its recruiting. The congregation would then need to have a Special Called Meeting (in September or October) to elect members to these vacancies.

The other answer is more difficult to discern because it is not about process. Instead, it is about spirit, energy and future. What happens to GCC if we don't risk moving forward? What happens to GCC if loyalty to our historic structure keeps us from trying something new? Reflect on these questions and take them to God in prayer as you prepare your minds and hearts for the Annual Meeting on May 21t.

When we consider and discuss the possibilities and pitfalls, concerns and critiques, hopes and dreams surrounding the new governance structure and the *Interim Constitution and Bylaws*, I encourage you to ask yourselves these three questions:

Where is God in all of this? How does this inspire God's work in us? Will this help us share God's love?

Asking these questions keeps us focused on the church's reason for being, and on what it means to be the disciples God calls us to be in our dynamic culture.

There's an old hymn that's set to a Welsh tune named **Ton-Y-Botel** (tune in a bottle).

Written by James Russell Lowell, the hymn is named **Once to Every Man and Nation**. The third line of the second verse is strikingly contemporary and relevant for us:

New occasions teach new duties, time makes ancient good uncouth.

In our dynamic culture, new occasions are all around us that make ancient good uncouth. What new duties will we embrace and embody for the sake of God's love? Finding our way into God's future will never be flawless. But, with God's grace, we will be faithful on the way. This year, GCC celebrated its 75th anniversary because, back in 1941, the Glenview Congregational Church voted itself out of existence so that the Glenview Community Church could be born. If our forbearers hadn't taken a risk on that very progressive decision, we might well still be the little church on Dewes Street.

On May 21, we will decide if GCC will take a risk on the progressive step of entering into a two year interim period with a new governance structure, constitution and bylaws. Through those two years we will try this new structure out, altering and fine tuning it so that it best enables GCC to do God's work. Then, in May of 2019, we will have a choice. Will we adopt it? Will we extend the interim period so we can continue to make it better? Or will we return to our present structure and documents? Even if we choose the third option, we will have tried something new.

Change is risky because its promise is liberally seasoned with peril. In that risky territory, the letter to the Hebrews assures us that there is one constant we can count on:

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. –Hebrews 13:8

In this journey of faith, our greatest confidence is in the One who leads us. And our history confirms that He will never fail or forsake us when we trust Him. See you in church!

PROPOSED INTERIM CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Proposed Constitution and Bylaws to be voted on at the Annual Meeting May 21. On Sunday, May 21, at the Annual Meeting, members of GCC will vote on a motion to replace the current Constitution and Bylaws of the Glenview Community Church with the Interim Constitution and Bylaws of **Glenview Community Church** as of May 2017 to be revised as needed, for adoption by May 2019." The Interim Constitution and Bylaws is intended to be used for a 2-year transition period, to incorporate any revisions or additions, so that a final Constitution and Bylaws would be voted on at the May 2019 Annual Meeting. Copies of this Interim Constitution and Bylaws are available in the Church Office, the Narthex and outside the chapel, and a link to this document is on the GCC website.

A favorable vote by at least twothirds of GCC members present and voting at the May 21, 2017 Annual Meeting will be required to adopt the Interim Constitution and Bylaws.

The Interim Constitution and Bylaws was drafted by the Governance Task Force (GTF). This document provides the framework for a new governance structure that was developed by the GTF over the last 2 years, after multiple informational/feedback sessions with the Spiritual Council, the Leadership Committee, the current boards and the congregation. Every Sunday starting April 23 until the May 21 vote, the GTF will have a table at the Fellowship Hour to answer your questions about the Interim Constitution and Bylaws and to provide information about the new governance structure. REPORT OF SPIRITUAL COUNCIL MEETING APRIL 25, 2017

Moderator Nancy Mullarkey called the meeting to order. Pastor Chuck Mize gave the opening prayer. Carol Habel provided the reflection. The 4/25 Spiritual Council packet was unanimously approved. Including the 3/20/17 minutes.

Dr. Mize reported that Easter Sunday attendance was the highest in 9 years. 400 people attended the Dylan Service. He also shared statistics concerning declining membership in the UCC and other mainline Protestant denominations.

Dr. Keckler reported on a wonderful Lenten season. She also reported on her participation in a regional Church and Ministry seminar with 130 attendees from UCC churches in the Midwest.

Rev. Hartung-Ciccolini shared the results of the Chili cook-off and auction. The event raised around \$12,000; enough to cover mission trip expenses. About 200 people attended the event. She also reported a good turnout for the Easter egg hunt.

Treasurer Chris Clark reported revenue through March of \$332,000, compared to \$370,000. Last year. Year to date expenses are down from last year by \$50,000.

Gretchen Grad provided a Leadership Committee update on progress in recruiting leaders for the proposed new governance structure. Efforts are also under way to recruit Ministry team members.

Nick Peters, Construction Committee Chair, provided an update and reported that the overarching goals of building improvements are accessibility, infrastructure, and gathering space. The committee will meet with TKWA in May to review the design based on those priorities.

Chris Clark, Treasurer, reported for the Stewardship Board that we have received 358 pledges to date totaling \$912.000. 52 units have increased their pledges by just over \$42,000 since the Spiritual Council began its intense communication effort with the congregation.

Joanne Peters, Fellowship Board Chair, reported that the Board is planning a lunch for the congregation after worship on June 11.

Matt Bauer, Finance Board Chair, reported that with the increased pledging, the projected 2017 deficit is down to \$275,000. At the next meeting we will see if this has improved and discuss potential areas to cut the budget if that is needed. At its May 16 meeting, the Spiritual Council will recommend a 2017 budget to present to the congregation for its approval at the May 21 Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

The Governance Task Force presented the proposed new governance structure and proposed Interim Constitution and Bylaws, taking guestions and comments from church members in attendance. A motion to recommend the document and the governance structure that it sets forth to the Congregation at the May 21 Annual Meeting for adoption passed.

A proposal for food allergy guidelines was discussed. The meeting was adjourned after a closing prayer.

GCC CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

The Church Construction Committee has been charged with completing the evolution of the Architect's plans, initially presented as conceptual drawings, into final detail plans, within our budget.

The process began with the Capital Plan Committee of the Forward in Faith Campaign polling the congregation for numerous proposed enhancements to the church. Those can all be grouped into three main categories: Accessibility, Infrastructure and Community.

First, Accessibility:

Beyond the requirements of ramps and elevators, the church must be more accessible and feel more welcoming to all members and visitors alike. When entering the building, it must be easier to identify and reach one's intended destination in the church, and to comfortably navigate our corridors while doing so.

Second, Infrastructure:

Even with a well-built church such as ours, much of the structure is more than 50 years old. The mechanical, plumbing and electrical systems of this church must be monitored and kept up to date and with an eye on the future.

Third, Community:

The goal is to respond to the needs of the members or the community within the church, as well as those services and activities that serve our church community beyond our membership.

We expect to be ready for your approval later this year. Throughout the process, we invite your input. Think of us as your conduit, your sounding board to express your comments, concerns, or questions about this project as it moves forward as we work toward the goals of accessibility, infrastructure and church community.


