SERMON ONE BY MACKENZIE BARNES

SERMON TWO VICTORIA POWERS



My first Sunday afternoon walking into the Pilgrim Youth Fellowship room, I was filled with apprehension and nervousness. I had been invited to join PYF by

a youth group member, and while I was at first hesitant, I now realize how invaluable my experience as a member has been.

I became a part of the PYF family a little over a year ago. For many, a year is not enough time to develop close friendships, but I quickly learned that PYF was not like any other, ordinary environment. My first Sunday here we played dodge ball; not your typical youth group activity, but then again this youth group isn't like many others. Immediately, I felt like I fit right in – everyone laughing, shouting, throwing balls at each other, running around, it was great. I continued to talk to my close friends already in PYF for the first few weeks, texting each one of them to make sure they were going to the meetings, not really branching out to the other members. But after those first few weeks, I began to talk to and interact with the other members. As the year continued I continued to branch out and soon I didn't need to send out the weekly Sunday texts to make sure my friends were going to meetings that week. I didn't need to feel shy or nervous; and that's exactly what kept me coming back to PYF week after week. The overwhelming sense of warmth and community this church family shared each week was more than enough to make me blissfully come to each Sunday meeting. Perhaps I had been too self-conscious at the very beginning of my journey to realize that that warmth and welcoming had been there all

along. The church members, kids and adults alike, welcomed me into their community with open arms and open hearts.

That is why I say the GCC youth group is not like many others; the group's overwhelming welcome-ness is hard to come by and God's message of acceptance and love is truly carried out through this church group. The PYF group welcomed me into their family and offered a safe environment, they accepted me unconditionally for who I was. I believe that through my participation in PYF I have made some life-long friends and it has illuminated, for me, the power of God's love. And while although I have only been a member of the GCC family for a little over a year, I can see how greatly it has impacted my life and has shown me the power of community and acceptance – there is no judgment there, no hate, and no loneliness.

And while I rely on the PYF group for many things - to hear my prayers, to help me when I struggle, to be there as my friend - the group only asks of me one thing – to be myself.

SERMON THREE BY TAYLOR BROWN



Jesus commanded us to love one another as he loved us. For me the greatest manifestation of this teaching is acceptance and tolerance. Lucky for me, I have found a living and breathing

example of these teachings, the community here at GCC. I never realized just how much this church and community meant to me until last summer.

It is somewhat taboo to start a conversation with strangers by asking, what do you think about the afterlife, but that's exactly how last years PYF mission trip went for me. Painting for six hours a day in the same room with people makes religious questions such as this more acceptable. Few topics push the limits of comprehensibility like religion. It serves to answer the most in-

tellectually strenuous questions, questions with no definitive answers and little data to support any particular conclusion. This crowded little room, with tar covered walls, and a soiled carpet somehow bred religious discussion.

Our site director happened to be from a conservative Evangelical church. I was eager to hear theology so different from my own, so I started asking questions. It was somewhat reckless, but my curiosity got the best of me. I asked about creation, salvation, and the literal accuracy of the Bible, all the while trying to keep an open mind. Some of what he said confused me and some of what he said offended me, but I kept going because I wanted to understand how his beliefs shaped his world view. He then asked me many of the same questions. I explained that the United Church of Christ is founded on the belief that religion is very personal, requiring a lot of interpretation, so there can be no ultimate truth. To that my site director scoffed, "your church should not even exist."

Here I was, a seventeen-year-old matched against a young man in seminary who could quote scripture like it was fact. I had never considered myself exceptionally religious but this man was attacking my faith and I was offended. Although I didn't agree with his beliefs, I never sought to belittle or invalidate them, I just accepted them as another interpretation of the same scripture. I couldn't understand why I could accept and tolerate his beliefs, but he completely rejected mine.

Then I realized, we hadn't grown up in the same faith community. I grew up knowing no matter who I was or where I was on life's journey, my church would accept me. He was taught to look at faith in a more black and white way with right and wrong answers.

He wrote me a note on the final day of our mission trip that I still have. It suggested I take time to look objectively at questions of faith, and if I did, I would see that my beliefs are wrong. Every time I read the note, I have to smile, because I know that even if I did decide he was right, my church would still love and accept me.

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SERMON FOUR BRADLEY BERG



Seven years ago I was up at this stage performing "Joseph And The Amazing Technicolor Dream Coat" with the children's choir. I was only 9 years old and I was

cast as one of the two jail guards. Who was I guarding? Joseph, and who played him? Jim Ryan. Ya that's what I thought, "I'm the guard?" Now how am I supposed to look like a guard over a man two and half times my size. Well it worked out and there are still videos and pictures to prove it. He did get out by the way.

During my years of choir I was led by adults and older choir members. The following year Jim became assistant director of the Children's Choir musical, where he displayed the traits of a great leader, something I hoped to pursue at church.

Upon entering High School I became active with the church's puppet team, where we would perform puppet shows to 1st through 5th grades, telling stories from the Bible with the characters, Nathaniel Narrator, Pop-up Polly and most importantly Scruffy. This group opened my first leadership opportunity where others depended on me to say my lines correctly, be in the right location, and arrive each week. However, it wasn't until I attended my first Pilgrim Youth Fellowship (PYF as it is commonly known), that I knew the open community of high schoolers and wonderful adults would be the perfect atmosphere to build my leadership abilities. I have met new friends and learned more about the old. The beginning of my search into learning about others began in 8th grade. At the 8th grade confirmation retreat all of the kids wrote on a rock, a quality trait that they would like to hold onto. After scribbling our trait we chucked them into the darken forest in front of us to be picked up by God. After throwing, I and another Confirmand wanted to head into the forest in the morning and find those rocks. Whether it was to see others traits or to see who threw theirs

the farthest I still don't know; however, we never went back to retrieve those stones. But through PYF meetings and events I have been searching for others traits ever since.

One great PYF event was during the fall retreat when the high schoolers went up early to Tower Hill Church Camp and the next day the Confirmands arrived with their high energy, ready to play and pray. The two nights that we were at camp Tower Hill we had a bonfire. Now I had always believed that bonfire was really bond b-o-n-d fire; however, that was a great name for what the experience was like those nights. We had 17 teens the first night and over 40 kids and adults the second night and you can be sure that we bonded around that fire. During that trip I also had the ability to lead new group games, which helped bring the group closer together.

This church and more importantly PYF has opened new doors as I have had the ability to experience different communities, kids, and adults through various programs and events. The most memorable events include; playing capture the flag, 4- square, hockey, dodge ball, curses and much more. This year I also had the chance to assist in designing the changes to the PYF room. Using Google sketch-up, a program I am sure to use in college, I was able to give the kids and adults a 3D view of what the PYF room could look like.

And now to my fellow seniors and PYF members, Jeremiah 29:11 says "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope." Let us all keep this in mind as each senior travels on through college and life, and each high schooler savors their last moments of child hood. As I continue my education at the University of Illinois studying Architecture, I hope to live in a leadership-living community. I know the skills and opportunities that I have gained from being an active member of this congregation and the wonderful youth group has set me on a great path of leadership and success in life.



SERMON FIVE LINDSAY LYHUS



PYF loves through our service to others. Whether it's a Sunday afternoon or a week long adventure out in Arkansas, West Virginia, or Minnesota, the people I've

met through PYF stand out in their unique capacity to love others. That passion to serve connects people unlike anything else I've experienced. Maybe it's just a matter of proximity-- it's hard not to learn anything about a person you've stood next to for 5 hours painting a shed in blazing heat. But I think it's more than that. When you work together towards a goal, and you see the impact you have on the people that need your help, that sticks with you. You're proud. And that makes a difference in the way you see the world.

Faith. It's not only an understanding of God, it's a lesson in compassion that every one can learn. The power of kindness and respect is sometimes undervalued in our society-- we throw money at problems that could be solved with just a little time and an attempt to understand the real issue. YOGA CLASSES


Need to improve your balance, strength and flexibility and feel good about yourself? Join us for basic yoga on Thursdays from 9-10 am in the Narthex.
