

TOMORROW

A little more than a hundred years ago, one of the great Thanksgiving hymns was written by the Rev. William P. Merrill at the Forty-First Street Presbyterian Church in Chicago where he was the pastor. That hymn is titled, *Not Alone for Mighty Empire*. For me, this is the most profound phrase from that hymn:

Standing in the living present, memory and hope between,

Lord, we would with deep thanksgiving, praise Thee more for things unseen.

Memory and hope between: after our annual meeting, that's where we are at Glenview Community Church. On Sunday, May 21, the congregation voted to enter into a two-year interim – *memory and hope be***tween** – of living with and fine tuning a new governance structure and the Interim Constitution and Bylaws that set it forth. Our old structure, Constitution and Bylaws have served GCC for a long time. Now we enter into a between time of trying something new...something streamlined and simplified... something focused on deepening, expanding and contemporizing our Message, Ministries and Mission. We'll have two years to live with it and adjust it...two years to live into it and determine if it is the structure we need to most effectively, persuasively and transformingly make God's love real in the world today. So with our structure we live between memory and hope.

And we do the same with our budget. In our budget, memory is the financial legacy that has been so generously provided by those who have gone before us. Their bequests have allowed us to make our living stewardship and our living Message, Ministries and Mission meet. We often talk

about this situation in terms of a deficit. The truth is that GCC can't have a deficit budget. What we have is a balanced budget that depends on legacy reserves to achieve that balance. So memory is our financial heritage. And hope is a renewed vitality for our stewardship. GCC has been using the same stewardship methodology for a number of years. Beginning now we will be experimenting with a new stewardship methodology to grow our stewardship. And in that is our hope.

Memory and hope between: this is not just where GCC voted to be on May 21. It's where we always are. We live between the memory of God's providential goodness that has brought us thus far, and the hope that God's providential goodness will lead us to that home where all God's people live in peace. Memory propels us toward thanksgiving as we are overwhelmed with the goodness and the grace that have led us and sustained us. And hope keeps us keeping on: believing that our fleeting circumstances pale in comparison to the reliability of God's promises and the constancy of God's love.

So, as we live between memory and hope, I pray that the interim structure will invite you in! Find a place on a ministry team. Create a new ministry team. Engage for 6 weeks, 6 months, or 6 years! Put your hands on God's love and let your hands make God's love real. That's what church is all about: not meetings, but building a house for ALL God's people!

Yes, between memory and hope is **the living present:** the place where, together, we belong to God on the journey. As Jesus promises us:

SPIRITUAL COUNCIL REPORT TO THE CONGREGATION

Items discussed at the Spiritual Council meeting on May 16, 2017 included:

Treasurer's Report:

Expenses have been well managed in 2017 with General & Administrative down \$7,000 and Property down \$21,000 from 2016 year to date. Net income from operations through April 30, 2017 is \$1652.

Stewardship:

Pledges have increased over \$100,000 in the last two months with the current total at \$968,200. This represents pledges from 361 families and includes 64 pledges that were increased throughout the campaign.

Slate for 2017-2018 Spiritual Council:

Two slates were approved for the next Spiritual Council year beginning June 1, 2017. One slate lists members if the new governance proposal is adopted and the second slate provides for interim members through Sept. 30 if the current constitution remains in effect. The slate will be voted on by the congregation on May 21, 2017 after the vote is taken on the proposed governance structure.

2017 Budget:

Spiritual Council approved the proposed budget recommended by the Finance Board. Thanks to a recent significant increase in pledges by certain members, the mission allocation was able to remain at the historic level. The proposed deficit for 2017 is \$154,999 which would leave approximately \$405,867 in the unrestricted reserve fund at year end. The budget will be voted on by the Congregation at the May 21, 2017 Annual Meeting.

Missions:

We celebrated Rev. Mize's report that GCC was the top outreach-giving church in the Northern Illinois Conference of the UCC with \$202,500 donated in 2015. The next closest church gave \$144,000. GCC's contributions include the Mission Outreach

budgeted donations and gifts made by the Women's Association, the youth, and the congregation to various recipients.

Forward in Faith:

Approved contract with architecture firm TKWA for up to \$10,000 covering both existing work and completing the revision of the master plan to fit within our budget.

Interim Constitution and By-Laws:

Recommended congregational approval of the proposed Interim Constitution and ByLaws, as revised to add seats at Spiritual Council for the Women's Association and Nursery School.

Food Allergy Concerns:

The proposal for the best way to address food allergy concerns continues to be revised and will be presented at the next Spiritual Council meeting.

The next Spiritual Council meeting is scheduled for June 27, 2017.

How do we find faith in God? I know many of us, especially in today's society, struggle with this question. In a novel we recently read in English class, *A Prayer for Owen Meany*, Owen, one of the main characters, is describing how he can have faith in God to his best friend John. Owen is drawing a rational parallel between how John knows there is a statue outside the church even though it is dark and his own belief in God. Owen states "YOU ABSOLUTELY KNOW SHE'S THERE—EVEN THOUGH YOU CAN'T SEE HER?"

"Yes!" John replies. And Owen states
"WELL, NOW YOU KNOW HOW I FEEL
ABOUT GOD, I CAN'T SEE HIM—BUT I
ABSOLUTELY KNOW HE IS THERE!"

Even with this analogy by Owen Meany, John has a hard time having faith in God as the story progresses. John eventually ends up gaining some faith because he sees the miracle of Owen Meany. I am a John. It is really hard to see something that doesn't physically exist. Especially as someone who is a math person and very much believes in logic, faith is even harder to wrap my head around. But it also amazes me. How can something that has no definite proof have billions of worshipers? I think it's due to the pure moral values of the Christian faith such as the golden rule and acceptance.

Even as someone who doesn't always believe in the presence of God, I find it easy to follow the teachings of Christianity. Hi, everyone. I'm Ben Schwabe, and I'm a senior at New Trier High School.

I was forced to go to my first PYF meeting as a freshman, and I was thrust into a group in which I knew virtually no one and spent my Mondays through Fridays 8 miles away from. I was decidedly neutral about the prospect of spending two hours on Sunday nights at church, and was relatively shy during our weekly meetings. That changed in May that year, when I was signed up by my mom to help with the Confirmation retreat. Being three years ago, my memories of the trip are hazy, but after

6 hours in a hot van trekking back and forth from Wisconsin, I had finally opened myself up to the other people on the trip, and had found that the other 5 people suffering through the ride were incredibly welcoming and interesting people as well.

I've learned that like everything else, the more you put into PYF, the more you get out of it. Putting in the time to come to each meeting and interact with each person has been one of my best decisions of the last four years.

And that's because PYF is a family. The sort of sitcom family which holds within it people of vastly different personalities and interests, not immune from mistakes and sometimes hilariously disorganized, but a support structure rivaling some "real" families.

Consider this: during my sophomore year, we went as a group to the funeral of a senior in PYF's mother. It was a four to five hour event held downtown, basically consuming an entire Sunday night. Even so, a sizeable number of people showed up to make the journey, a large amount of which were freshman and sophomores, people who didn't know this member that well but were still willing to take the time out of their always-busy schedules to support them.

PYF as a group has been especially key to me due to my separation from almost everyone in the group. It has provided me with a home away from home and a set of friends completely different from those that I have at New Trier, and a place to truly distance myself from the ever-busy life of high school. It has always been nice to be able to completely forget about my regular life for a few hours each week.


It is truly a community in that friendships develop across grades and social circles, a group in which each person has gifted me with a lasting memory.

It is hard to see something so important to you begin to come to a close, and just as sobering to realize that while the group will continue to grow and prosper, you may soon become merely a footnote in one of Elizabeth's old mission trip stories. An odd feeling overcomes you when you go help one last time on a confirmation retreat and realize that regardless of how many kids you can convince to join, you won't spend a single meeting together. The scripture read earlier today said "I will not abandon you as orphans". This promise of unending connection truly reflects the impacts of PYF. The friends I have gained who have gone on to colleges and gap years and the like still are important influences on me to this day. And so against the backdrop of finality that is this "Senior Sermon" and our upcoming graduations, it is the lasting relationships I have made in this group that will not cease to exist once I leave this place.
