Pilgrim's Progress

In September of 2002, during the early months of my work as your Senior Minister, we revamped the Broadcaster. Several concerns were raised about the change in layout, the change in paper size, concern about articles and information being briefer, and the change in color of the paper made it difficult for members to identify the Broadcaster immediately in their mail or to distinguish it from junk mail. Later, I discovered that the layout, paper size and color were nearly identical to the format of the Broadcaster used in the 1980s.

With the new Broadcaster format in the fall of 2002, I gave a title to my weekly column. I chose, "A Pilgrim's Progress," for the title and expressed my indebtedness to John Bunyan and Tom Austin for the title.

John Bunyan (1628-1688) was a nonconformist preacher and writer in Bedford, England. In 1660 the government sought to force religious conformity to gain unity in the land and arrest the growth of independent churches. John Bunyan refused to conform and was imprisoned where he remained for twelve years. In 1672, Charles II signed a Declaration of Religious Indulgence and Bunyan was freed. He immediately became the pastor of the Independent Congregation in Bedford. A year later the King withdrew his Declaration and Bunyan went back to prison for another four years. After his release, on February 18, 1677 he published The Pilgrim's Progress, an allegory about Christian's journey through life from damnation to salvation.

Tom Austin was my friend, colleague, supervisor, and mentor. He also was a preacher and a nonconformist. He was a gifted preacher, caring pastor, committed churchman, and stimulating thinker with a contagious sense of humor. He did not take himself or the church too seriously. He was serving as Senior Min-

ister of the Knollwood Baptist Church in Winston-Salem, NC when he died of cancer nearly twenty years ago. The column he wrote in that church's newsletter was entitled "A Pilgrim's Progress."

Communication skills are essential for a minister and writing is one of those essential communication skills. Like George Buttrick, one of my preaching professors, I've been writing a sermon a week whether I needed it or not. Of course, I've needed a sermon each week for many years. I also expanded my writing to include the publication of twelve books. Each week I used "A Pilgrim's Progress" to communicate with every member of Glenview Community Church. I have been pleasantly surprised by the number of people who faithfully read these articles each week. You may have noticed in some of my articles attributes of a nonconformist preacher or a writer. I make no apologies for that. I gladly continued in the tradition of John Bunyan and Tom Austin.

What you read in this column from week to week were reflections, observations, and insights. Some were personal. Others were about what was happening in Glenview Community Church. Still others were comments on events and situations in the culture and the world. I wish that all of the columns I wrote would have given clear evidence that I was making progress as a pilgrim, but I know they didn't. Sometimes it looked like I was making great progress and other times it looked like I was taking one step forward and two steps backward. It was my desire that you, the reader, might join me on the journey and that you might see places where your journey intersected with mine and that by stopping and looking around at those intersections you might progress as a pilgrim.

Only in hindsight as we look in the rear-

I grew up in a church in Louisville, Kentucky. It was a wonderful church, filled with loving caring people. My mom made sure the entire family went to church every Sunday without fail. It's just what you do down there. I became very involved in the youth activities of the church. The youth programs were outstanding, including allowing kids to serve communion monthly, sing in the choir and read the weekly scripture.

Several friends and I joined the Cub Scouts and then the Boy Scouts. The troop was sponsored by our church and was a very dynamic, active group. One of the most inspirational people I have ever known was my scoutmaster. He was a man in his forties who had polio and was confined to a wheel chair. But he was not confined in how he lived his life. His car was outfitted with hand controls and he drove himself everywhere. He never missed a scout meeting. He went on twenty mile hikes with us. With ropes tied to each side, we would pull him up the hills and he would coast down. On flat ground, he wanted no help; he did all the work himself. You couldn't help but work hard around him and learn to help people in the right way. He developed many Eagle Scouts, including myself.

I have to admit that during my college years and early married life, regular church attendance was not a high priority. When Cindy and I were in the process of adopting our son, Brian, one of the topics our case worker wanted to discuss was our feeling on religion. We assured her that both of us had been brought up in Christian homes and believed that it was very important for children to have a strong faith experience and that we would certainly be involved in a church community. At that point our caseworker said "That big red brick church on Glenview Road might be a good one for you. It seems like there is always something going on there and I hear they have a good children's program." We filed that information away and pulled it out a few years later. By that time we were more established in the community and knew lots of people who attended

Glenview Community Church. GCC was the first and only church we visited. It felt comfortable, like coming home, immediately. Only later did we find out its close affiliation with Disciples of Christ, the denomination in which I grew up.

Both of our children appreciated the thought provoking challenges of Confirmation classes and were very involved in PYF. They loved the annual "work camps" and I think Katie would say her involvement in the Christmas Pageant was one of the high lights of her high school years. Incidentally, she is now teaching the Junior High kids at her church in Minneapolis. Thanks Pam and Kerry.

While I was traveling for work and unable to do much more than attend services occasionally, Cindy was able to take advantage of some of the educational things that were offered. She would come home from a Kerygma class eager to discuss what the group had talked about that week.

One of the most rewarding weeks of my life occurred several years ago. Cindy and I, following our children's footsteps, went with 18 other GCC members to Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, Mississippi for adult work camp. Both of our children had been there before Hurricane Katrina devastated the whole Gulf area including Biloxi. The trip had a profound affect on them and we wondered how the work camp experience would affect us. We were privileged to work with other church members: building relationships with each other and helping to rebuild two homes destroyed by the hurricane. I will never forget the devastation we saw and the horrible living conditions these people dealt with on a daily basis. The gratitude of the two homeowners and the act of helping those in desperate need showed me why we are put here in the first place.

I have felt the presence of God on this earth from a raft in the Grand Canyon to the top of a mountain on skis. I have felt his presence holding a paint brush in Biloxi. But most of all I am moved by his presence every time I enter the Sanctuary here at Glenview Community Church. I am looking forward to the coming years. I know there will be many things that test my faith but I know there will be many more opportunities for my faith and spirituality to grow.
